The next generation of leaders in the state unit of the BJP are even more aligned with this strategy. While the senior leaders, including B. S. Yediyurappa, showed restraint when it came to communal politics, the younger leadership has been more vocal about it and has gained prominence within the party.

The BJP now faces a choice of either pushing the Hindutva agenda as aggressively as it has done in northern states or adopting a more moderate approach. However, both options pose challenges for the party. A strong emphasis on the Hindutva agenda may not resonate well with its core social base, the Lingayats, who have supported the BJP not primarily because of Hindutva, but because they perceived more political opportunities within the party than with other alternatives. The Lingayat community was founded to counter the dominance of Brahminical Hinduism, and its members still adhere to unique traditions that are distinct from mainstream Hindu traditions.

The BJP's Hindutva agenda, which seeks to homogenize religious practices, poses a threat to the distinct identity of the Lingayat sect. Although there are some vocal voices within the community challenging the Hindutva agenda, many remain silent or express their concerns indirectly. However, there is an underlying tension within the community about fully aligning with the BJP's communal line. Continued association with the Lingayat community may limit the BJP's potential for broadening its support base. To come to power independently and remain true to its ideological colors, the BJP needs to build a broad coalition that caters to the political ambitions of a wide spectrum of castes. However, if the BJP reconfigures its support base to accommodate various castes, the Lingayats may no longer feel a sense of ownership and may begin shifting their loyalty. In the Vokkaliga heartland, the BJP's Hindutva politics is also unlikely to go unchallenged. The BJP has made efforts to expand its influence in this region, but with limited success thus far. The Vokkaligas, who are at the forefront of the Kannada movement, are sensitive to the BJP's politics of stifling subnational sentiments. Celebrated Kannada poet Kuvempu, an icon among Vokkaligas, inspired generations to resist Brahminical Hinduism. During the election campaign, the BJP attempted to propagate fictional stories about Vokkaliga warriors killing Tipu Sultan, the Muslim ruler of Mysore, in an effort to incite anti-Muslim sentiments among the Vokkaligas. However, prominent Vokkaliga religious leaders intervened, asking BJP leaders to stop spreading narratives as history. Another Vokkaliga religious leader openly criticized the government for scrapping Muslim reservations to increase reservations for Vokkaligas, stating that they did not want it if it came at the expense of others. These instances demonstrate the resistance within the Vokkaliga community against the BJP's divisive tactics.

Civil society organizations played a significant role in actively mobilizing voters against the BJP's communal politics during the 2023 elections. Movements such as Bahutva Karnataka, Sahabhalve, Jagruta Karnataka, and several other organizations joined forces under the banner of Eddelu Karnataka to raise awareness about the dangers of divisive politics and its impact on the idea of a harmonious and inclusive Karnataka envisioned by poet Kuvempu. Such activism against communalism is unlikely to dissipate with the election results. Civil society organizations are determined to defeat the ideology of communalism, even if it means beyond electoral battles. These organizations aim to revive the true essence of Karnataka, and their activism will pose resistance and mobilization efforts against communal politics, regardless of its intensity. Additionally, several dormant and scattered movements resurfaced in response to the rise of Hindutva. Various factions within the Dalit community regrouped to galvanize voters and prevent the BJP from expanding its support base among Dalits. They highlighted the BJP's historical antagonism towards reservation policies, viewing the increase in SC/ST reservation as an election ploy. The results show that in constituencies with a higher Dalit population, the BJP received a lower percentage of votes compared to the Congress. The farmers' movement also gained momentum by addressing the issue of the Centre's farm laws, which remain unresolved in Karnataka. The pressure from these popular movements is likely to continue influencing politics and governance.

The BJP's attitude towards federalism is another aspect of its core agenda that may face challenges in Karnataka. The party's centralizing tendencies and alleged neglect of Karnataka in economic and cultural matters may fuel demands for stronger regional politics. While the Janata Dal (Secular) is often seen as a regional party, it has not emerged as a prominent voice for regional aspirations.
