The paper also discusses the importance of institutional support, such as dedicated tourism institutes and research initiatives, in fostering a skilled workforce and uncovering hidden cultural treasures. Through this comprehensive approach, the paper argues that integrating culture and tourism in Nagaland is not only viable but also holds significant promise for the region's future progress.

INTRODUCTION

Nagaland, located in the northeastern part of India, is a region characterized by its spectacular landscapes, rich biodiversity, and vibrant cultural heritage. Known for its diverse tribal communities, each with its unique traditions, customs, and festivals, Nagaland presents a cultural richness that is both unique and captivating. Nagaland is often referred to as the Switzerland of the East due to its picturesque landscapes, vibrantly colorful sunrises and sunsets, lush and verdant flora and fauna, cliffs, waterfalls, springs, virgin forests, lakes, rivers, and mountains (Zarenthung, 2011) (as cited in M.V, 2023). Historically, the state has maintained a relatively isolated existence, which has helped preserve its traditional ways of life. However, in recent years, there has been a growing interest in promoting tourism as a means to boost the local economy, with cultural tourism emerging as a particularly promising area.

Sinha and Varshney, (2017), opines that tourism which was once aimed at recreation has become a major industry and economic sector in India. Heritage is increasingly being recognized as a valuable resource, not only for cultural promotion but also for fostering social and economic sustainable development and the well-being of populations. This is particularly evident in its role as a key attraction in the cultural tourism market. Cultural tourism is emerging as a significant employment sector and a driver of financial exchange. As one of the vital and global pillars of the economy, the tourism industry is gaining more importance each day. In this light, this paper aims to explore the economic potential of cultural tourism in Nagaland by identifying and

highlighting key cultural resources that can attract tourists. These resources include the state's vibrant festivals, folk dances, folklore, traditional games and sports. The purpose of the paper is to provide a comprehensive analysis of how cultural tourism can be further developed to boost the local economy and preserve Nagaland's unique cultural heritage.

OVERVIEW OF NAGALAND'S RICH CULTURAL HERITAGE

Nagaland is renowned for its vibrant festivals and folk dances, which reflect the rich cultural heritage of its various tribes. The most famous among these is the Hornbill Festival, celebrated annually in December, showcasing traditional music, dance, and arts from all the tribes of Nagaland. Other notable festivals include the Sekrenyi Festival of the Angami tribe, the Moatsu Festival of the Ao tribe, and the Aoling Festival of the Konyak tribe. Each festival is marked by traditional dances such as the War Dance, the Bamboo Dance, and the Harvest Dance, performed in elaborate traditional attire. Throughout the year, various festivals are joyously celebrated, each providing a unique glimpse into the vibrant culture of Nagaland (Den-I Phom & Baruah, 2022). These festivals and dances not only preserve the cultural practices of the tribes but also attract numerous tourists, contributing significantly to the local economy.

The folklore of Nagaland is a treasure trove of myths, legends, and oral traditions passed down through generations. Traditional customs, such as the headhunting rituals of the past, intricate beadwork, weaving practices, and communal sharing and cooperation, provide deep insight into the values and way of life of the Naga tribes. The preservation and promotion of these folklore and customs can attract cultural tourists interested in experiencing and understanding the unique heritage of Nagaland. Sekhose and Mishra (2024) states that; Nagaland's cultural richness makes it a prime destination for authentic experiences, featuring vibrant festivals, dances, and indigenous traditions. With its diverse ethnic tribes, each possessing unique customs, visitors are immersed in a rich tapestry of culture.

Nagaland's rich cultural heritage is also vividly expressed through its indigenous games and traditional sports, such as wrestling and bamboo pole climbing, which are prominently featured during festivals and community gatherings. These games not only provide entertainment but also play a crucial role in preserving physical fitness and fostering community spirit. Traditional games hold deep cultural significance, serving as a means of preserving and transmitting heritage and often intertwining with rituals and celebrations that mark important events or seasons (Shimray, 2024).

'Naga wrestling,' or 'Naga-style wrestling,' practiced by the men of the Tenyimi Naga tribes, symbolizes masculinity regardless of size or age. It is a widely participated in and well-preserved cultural practice used historically to resolve conflicts under the supervision of elders (Tsukru et al., 2021). Similarly, the centuries-old game of greased bamboo-climbing remains popular in Nagaland. In this challenging game, teams of three to four members race to climb a greased bamboo pole, with a prize tied at the top. Each tribe has its own method for awarding prizes, and the game symbolizes overcoming obstacles through physical skill and gathering Nature's rewards (Barua, 2022). Promoting these indigenous games can enhance cultural tourism by offering tourists the chance to engage with and witness these traditional sports.

Nagaland's rich historical backdrop and breathtaking natural landscapes significantly enhance its cultural tourism appeal. Nagaland boasts numerous notable tourist destinations, including culturally significant sites such as the medieval Kachari Ruins, Diezephe Craft Village, and the Handloom and Handicraft Emporium. Other prominent attractions include the North East Zone Cultural Centre in Dimapur, the World War II Cemetery, the State Museum, and the Catholic Cathedral. Visitors can also explore the State Emporium for souvenirs and ethnic crafts, the Belho Weavers, and the Naga Heritage Complex at Kisama. Additional sites like the Heritage Museum and Crafts Centre at Khonoma and the Heritage DC's Bungalow in Kohima further enrich the state's tourism offerings. Each of these locations embodies the rich cultural heritage and pride of Nagaland. (M.V, 2023).

OVERVIEW OF CULTURAL TOURISM

Cultural tourism primarily refers to the exploration and enjoyment of various cultural expressions by tourists, including heritage sites, art, folklore, and other cultural manifestations (Mousavi, et.al, 2016). It refers to the practice of traveling to experience the cultural heritage of a place. This includes visits to festivals, historic sites, art galleries, museums, and participation in local customs and traditions. The significance of cultural tourism lies in its dual capacity to preserve and promote cultural heritage while also generating economic benefits. By attracting tourists interested in learning about and experiencing different cultures, communities can create new employment opportunities, stimulate the local economy, and support the maintenance and revival of traditional crafts and practices.

The benefits of cultural tourism are manifold. Economically, it generates income for local communities, creates jobs, and supports small businesses. Culturally, it promotes the preservation of heritage and traditions, fostering pride and identity among locals. Additionally, cultural tourism enhances education and global awareness by promoting understanding and appreciation of diverse cultures. Cultural tourism has emerged as a significant economic sector globally, including in India. It involves travel centered around experiencing a destination's unique cultural, historical, and artistic heritage. This sector attracts visitors seeking authentic cultural experiences and generates substantial revenue for local economies. By promoting a region's traditions, festivals, and historical sites, cultural tourism stimulates economic activity through spending on accommodations, dining, transportation, and local crafts.

In India, cultural tourism has made a notable impact due to the country's rich and diverse heritage. With attractions ranging from ancient temples and historical monuments to vibrant festivals and traditional arts, India's cultural assets draw tourists from around the world. This influx supports various sectors such as hospitality, transportation, and retail, while also aiding in the preservation of cultural heritage. Zagade & Deore (2020) highlight that cultural tourism acts as a financial tool for economic development by attracting visitors interested in the historical, artistic, and lifestyle features of an area.

Cultural tourism has the potential to rejuvenate local economies by drawing visitors who spend on accommodation, food, transportation, and local products. This influx of revenue can revitalize small towns and rural areas, providing crucial financial support to local businesses and communities (Lankford & Howard, 1994). In Nagaland, the development of cultural tourism could boost economic activity, reduce poverty, and improve living standards. The sector also creates jobs, from tour guides and hotel staff to restaurant workers and transport operators, thereby reducing unemployment and developing new skills (Holloway, 1994). Additionally, cultural tourism fosters the growth of small and medium-sized family enterprises, such as guesthouses, homestays, and craft shops, which offer unique experiences and ensure that tourism benefits are widely distributed (Bachleitner and Zins, 1999). This growth can also lead to the preservation and revitalization of traditional crafts and practices, ensuring their continuity for future generations.

DISCUSSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The government of Nagaland can play a pivotal role in promoting cultural tourism through supportive initiatives and policies. This includes investing in infrastructure development, providing financial incentives for tourism-related businesses, and establishing clear guidelines for sustainable tourism practices. While governmental efforts in promoting festivals and cultural events, such as the Hornbill Festival, are commendable, there are still numerous ways in which the government can significantly enhance the growth of tourism in the state. These additional measures could include improving transportation networks, enhancing digital connectivity, and offering training programs to build a skilled workforce in the tourism sector. By taking a comprehensive and proactive approach, the government can unlock the full potential of Nagaland's cultural tourism and drive sustainable economic growth.

In the first place, establishing a dedicated tourism institute or university in Nagaland may be noted as crucial for advancing specialized education and training in tourism management, hospitality, and cultural studies. Such institutions would serve as centers of excellence, fostering research and innovation in sustainable tourism practices. They would offer comprehensive programs to equip students with the skills necessary for excelling in the tourism industry. Furthermore, these institutes could collaborate with local communities and businesses to create hands-on training opportunities, ensuring graduates are well-prepared to meet industry demands. Additionally, by setting high standards for training and certification, these institutions would help maintain high service quality across the tourism sector. Beyond education, these institutes could play a key role in preserving and promoting Nagaland's cultural heritage, documenting and integrating traditional knowledge into the tourism experience. In a similar vein, Yanthan (2024) has called for a notable initiative that could involve repurposing the Naga Heritage Village at Kisama into a dedicated Naga Heritage Institute/College/University. This would not only provide year-round training and education in tourism but also attract international students and researchers, ensuring continuous engagement with Naga cultural heritage.

Secondly, establishing a dedicated institute offering training and workshops in traditional Naga crafts and skills, such as weaving and bamboo crafts, can provide significant benefits. These institutes can serve as cultural and educational hubs where both outsiders and Naga youth can gain hands-on experience in these traditional arts. By attracting visitors eager to learn these crafts, the institutes can generate income and create employment opportunities for local artisans and experts, preserving and promoting their skills. These centers can include exhibit halls where the crafts are showcased and marketed, providing artisans with a platform to display their work to a broader audience. This not only helps in sustaining the craft economically but also enhances its visibility and appreciation on a larger scale. The exhibit halls can host regular exhibitions, fairs, and cultural events, turning them into vibrant community spaces that celebrate Naga heritage.

Thirdly, there is significant potential in uncovering and promoting lesser-known festivals, sites, and historical elements in Nagaland. The government can play a pivotal role by supporting research initiatives aimed at identifying and reviving these hidden cultural gems. For instance, the *Khukhu* Festival, celebrated in Porba Village, (Hesuh, 2024) focuses on the girl child and features unique rituals that could attract considerable interest from tourists seeking authentic and culturally significant experiences. Similarly, Zanubou Mountain in Phek District, while not widely recognized, offers potential as a scenic and cultural destination. By investing in research and documentation of such festivals and sites, the government can enhance the diversity of cultural tourism offerings in Nagaland. This approach not only broadens the appeal of the state as a tourist destination but also contributes to the preservation and revitalization of its rich cultural heritage. Expanding tourism in this manner can stimulate local economies, create new opportunities for community engagement, and ensure that Nagaland's cultural wealth is shared with a global audience.

CONCLUSION

This paper aimed at highlighting the rich cultural heritage of the Nagas and establishing cultural tourism as a path to economic advancement. Nagaland's diverse traditional practices and rich cultural heritage has been presented as a strong case for developing cultural tourism as a key economic driver.
