LITERATURE REVIEW:-

A study by Greenhow and Robelia (2009) titled Old Communication, New Literacies: Social Network Sites as Social Learning Resources indicates that students are involved in a complex range of creative communicative activities within the space of social networking sites. These activities suggest deep attention, tone, style, knowledge of subject matter and writing process to the viewers and could be noted positively because all of those elements are essential for enhancing communication abilities.

But **Henderson** (2010) stresses that face-to-face, person-to-person communications involve choice of words, vocal variety, body language, movements and positioning, facial expressions, listening skills and much more which together make up multiple components of messaging that are effective. Nonetheless, in virtual communications as in communicating through social networking sites, a lot of these aspects are missing as they are substituted with emoticons, cameras for visual cues, microphone for audio cues etc. Henderson (2010) further mentions that, the crucial components of effective communication that are lacking in virtual communication are prompt responses and feedback which are possible through in-person interactions only.

The following literature review indicate that- These issues have the adverse impact on the development of interpersonal social skills (Pierce - 2009), inappropriate and dangerous behaviors that texting may mediate such as sexting and cyber bullying (Drouin and Landgraff-2012;, Parris; Varjas, Meyers, and Cutts, 2012), distraction to classroom instruction and the reduction of students' attention and comprehension. (Kuznekoff, Munz, and Titsworth, 2015; Tindell & Bohlander, 2012), and its negative effects on literacy and learning (Drouin, 2011; Parris Drouin and Davis, 2009; Rosen, Lim, Carrier and Cheever, 2011) and the development of linguistics Skill (De Jonge and Kemp, 2012; Drouin and Driver, 2014; Rosen, Chang, Erwin, Carrier and Cheever, 2010); among others.

The impacts of social media on society have been the focus of a great deal of research. Some significant findings and research areas on this subject state that, social media platforms have completely changed the way individuals connect and communicate. And that the constructive as well as the destructive social interactions such as cyber bullying can be facilitated by them.

Decreased Face-to-Face Communication: Excessive reliance on social media causes deterioration in one's ability to communicate face-to-face. This becomes harder for young people to perform in the real life situations, handle real-world, face-to-face interactions, feel more at ease expressing themselves through written text or emoticons, pushing them under the low confident lot.

The Incapability to Interpret Emotional Cues: The contemporary lot of young people find it difficult to appropriately interpret the emotional cues when there are not in the face-to-face interactions and would struggle to detect emotional cues correctly, causing misunderstandings.

Mental Health: Several research studies have looked into the connection between mental health and social media use. These studies have explicitly confirmed that Anxiety, Sadness, and Loneliness are found to be related to the excessive use, cyber bullying and social comparison.

Declined Empathy: According to the research, an essential human quality of empathy can decrease over time if a people spend a lot of time interacting with others online and are not aware of the immediate effects of what they say. In order to interact effectively and create enduring relationships, empathy is essential.

Distorted Self-Portrayal: Social media frequently promotes the display of well chosen, perfected versions of a person's life. These portrayals leave an adverse effect on authenticity and sincere communication skills by creating a gap between online personal and in-person interactions.

Fear of Missing Out (FMO): It is a social response to the idea that other people are in a better position than themselves and are leading confortable lives which is being missed by them. They start believing that they are unfortunate and are missing out something special. Social networking sites can heighten people's fear of missing out on social gatherings and experiences which can make people prioritize online interactions beyond in-person connections and conversation.

Impact on Language Skills: The informal language and acronyms that characterize the social media communication leaves an unwelcome impact on the formal language skills. It is not a surprise that in the personal, professional and academic contexts the widespread usage of social media is in vogue for exchanging ideas, narratives, and experiences both personal and professional. It has had a significant impact on how their day to day interaction where in the style in professional and academic contexts exhibits a decline in one on one communication. Although social media is practical, it can cause a loss of emotional intelligence and social skills making it difficult for people to build everlasting and meaningful relationships.

Compressed Writing: Messages have been getting shorter and more concise, beginning with the 2000s' character limit on text messaging and continuing today with the 140-character tweet. Summarized writing is also been adopted in other domains of communication including compressed work correspondence, abbreviated student-teacher correspondence and shortened promotional messaging leaving an emotional gap or mental connectedness.

Abbreviated Terms: Online chats have adopted the abbreviated communication style that gained popularity with the advent of text messaging in the 2000s. In addition, it has been incorporated into traditionally nonabbreviated communication channels like email, spoken language, and even academic writing.

Textism: In the research studies on texting, Drouin and Driver (2014) examined the relationships between texting behaviors (i.e. Texting frequency and text message transcription) the use of textisms and literacy abilities (i.e., reading, reading fluency, spelling and vocabulary) of college students. **Textism** density in text messages was shown to be strongly and negatively connected to reading and spelling even if texting frequency "was not significantly related to any measure of literacy" (p. 259). In other words, textese that employed texting more frequently scored lower on tests of evaluated literacy.

Further research revealed that certain textual categories like accent style had a good correlation with reading and spelling like leaving out apostrophes, had a negative correlation with all literacy skills and a substantial negative correlation with reading. Certain academicians expressed concern about this, citing research that links "textese" to adverse impacts on literacy abilities including writing and precision in reading. According to other research, employing "textese" has not much impact on one's ability to spell or use grammar correctly.

Echo Chambers and Polarization: Social media technologies generate "echo chambers" where users see the information that supports their pre-existing opinions only and through which they also strengthen preexisting biases. This can eventually result in an unhealthy society by polarizing people and preventing them from having an open mind and freedom of expression.

News and Information Distribution: Research has examined that the digital media is an essential component in the dissemination of news and information. The effects of feedback networks, fake news and the quick spread of information during emergencies through technology affects the communication skills negatively.

Misinterpretation: Written communication such as email and text messages can be easily misinterpreted due to the absence of voice tone and body language and hence the exact message is not conveyed leading to misunderstandings and conflicts. The volume of information available through technology can be overwhelming but distorted and confusing information creates havocs and steals the peace of mind.

Advertising and Customer Behavior: Research indicates how well social media platforms are used for marketing and advertising work and influences the customer behavior. Most of the communication of an advertisement is misleading. The unnecessary adverting messages and calls are not only irritating and disturbing but also invade the privacy and peace. They bombard the false claims to exploit our fears and insecurities, promote wrong kind of behavior and practices sometimes. It also involves spreading negative remarks about their competitors and reducing others' reputation affecting negatively.

CONCLUSION:

Thus, along with creating a positive atmosphere and social settings and opportunities for advancing human interaction, the goal of research in the new digital age should be to build the technologies that address human issues in understanding how the innovations are affecting human interaction and that the quick responses and unrestricted access to information has become its characteristics. The digital age is one of instantaneous communication where they have altered the ways in which individuals behave, write, act and ultimately communicate.

In order to gain a deeper understanding, further research should be the priority for empirical studies in the field of human communication.
