The paper also explores Patel’s contributions to administrative restructuring, particularly the establishment of the Indian Administrative Service and Indian Police Service, which formed the “steel frame” of India. This study argues that Patel’s vision not only secured India’s territorial integrity but also laid the foundation for its long-term political stability and unity.
