In relationship with students, teachers are clearly super ordinate. The recognition of the power of the teacher is the predominant feature of the relationship between the teacher and the student. - Maheshwari, A.N. (chairperson, NCTE), stated in her resource paper, that after independence education system in the country has expanded very rapidly.
