Thewa jewellery is a traditional form of Indian jewellery renowned for its exquisite craftsmanship and intricate designs. Designs in traditional Thewa jewellery are inspired by various themes that are culturally rooted and display the regal grandeur of Rajasthan. Among the traditional motifs in Thewa jewellery, peacock motifs stand out as one of the most preferred motifs even today due to their cultural significance and artistic appeal. The study explores the cultural significance and artistic expression of the peacock motif in Thewa jewellery. Data collected for the study using primary sources mainly includes interviews with Thewa craft practitioners and secondary sources includes images of peacock motifs in Thewa jewellery and existing literature on cultural significance of peacock. The artistic expression of the peacock motif has been studied through forms, sizes and placements in different Thewa jewellery products.

I. INTRODUCTION

The peacock motif has a special place in Indian art and craft, symbolizing beauty, elegance, and divine significance. Over centuries, this iconic symbol has been intricately integrated into Indian culture, appearing in diverse art forms and craft traditions. From paintings and textiles to sculptures and jewellery, the peacock motif embellishes numerous masterpieces, representing cultural identity and artistic expression. Thewa jewellery is a traditional form of Indian jewellery renowned for its exquisite craftsmanship and intricate designs created by fusing 23K gold foil onto glass. Originating in the Pratapgarh district of Rajasthan, India, about 350 years ago, Thewa craft was invented by Nathu Lal Soni. Maharaja Samant Singh of Pratapgarh was highly impressed with his craftmanship and he bestowed him the title of "Rajsoni". The craft skills were passed from one generation to the other secretively among the members of Rajsoni and even today the members of Rajsoni are keeping the tradition alive by making innovative jewellery designs and other products. Designs in Thewa jewellery are intricate and rich in symbolism, drawing inspiration from nature, mythology, and scenes from the life of royals. Thewa craftsman meticulously handcrafts the motifs onto gold foil and fuse it with glass using a special process that is heavily guarded. Initially Thewa craft was used for making objects and during the colonial era Thewa pieces were gifted to British visitors by the royals. The craft diminished after independence but was revived by jewellery firms and designers by 1995. There are only a few names to

be associated with the revival of Thewa and most of the work done during the revival includes Thewa Jewellery that stands out for its vibrant colours and detailed designs. The peacock motif is one of the most admired and widely used motifs in Thewa jewellery designs and always in demand whether it is traditional elaborate or contemporary minimalistic Thewa jewellery.

II. STATEMENT OF THE PROBLEM

The peacock motif holds a profound symbolic importance in traditional Indian jewellery. Very limited research has been done on the motifs used in Thewa jewellery designs. Despite the rich cultural significance of design inspirations in Thewa craft, there remains a gap in study of the motifs. The motifs have been modified with changing buying preferences of consumers but the deep cultural roots of Thewa jewellery keep some of the traditional motifs intact in contemporary jewellery. One of the motifs that has existed in Thewa jewellery since its origin is the "Peacock" motif but the research on cultural significance and artistic expression of the peacock motif in Thewa jewellery is scarce. The study will focus on the cultural significance and aesthetic appeal of the peacock motif by studying its various forms, sizes and placements in Thewa jewellery.

Using secondary resources, cultural significance of peacock motif is examined and visual content analyses has been done to study the artistic expression of peacock motifs in Thewa jewellery designs. Very limited research has been done on Thewa Jewellery designs and motifs therefore peacock motif studies from other traditional crafts has been referred.

- 1. Naveen Kumar (2020) in a study "From forms to formless" discusses that the peacock symbolizes integrity, truth, honour, beauty, and strength, while also embodying qualities such as self-esteem, humour, vision, spiritual awakening, long life, confidence, and awareness. Its majestic presence encompasses a spectrum of virtues and attributes, from the profound to the playful.
- 2. Shefali Vaidya (2021) in the article "A unique motif in Indian Art Part V: Divyamayura The Celestial Peacock – 2" opines that since ancient times, from cave drawings in Bhimbetka to contemporary truck decorations, the peacock has been a common theme in Indian art, reflecting the deep roots of Indian culture. While becoming known worldwide, the peacock continues to symbolize Indian civilization, captivating people across borders with its enduring charm.
- 3. Rajinder Kaur and Prof. Ila Gupta, PhD (2016) in a study titled "Peacock Motif in Phulkari: A Comprehensive Analysis" investigated that in Punjab, women have skillfully embroidered peacocks in Phulkari, portraying them holding lotuses, appearing in pairs, fighting snakes, dancing, and displaying feathers, among other perspectives. Within Phulkari embroidery, the peacock is depicted in various linear styles, ranging from realistic to geometric, stylized, and abstract forms.

- 4. Aditi Shah (2016) in an article "Peacock: A Constant in Indian Culture" viewed that for ages, the peacock has been important in Indian tradition, enchanting visitors with its beautiful feathers and captivating dance since ancient days. It came to represent royalty for numerous Indian leaders and eventually became the national bird of India.
- 5. Fatima Zahra and Dr. Sarena Abdullah (2018) in a research paper on "Aesthetic, Patriotic and Religious Peacock Motifs: Framing the Meanings of Pakistani Truck Art through Foss' and Aristotle's Rhetorical Approach" examined that peacock motifs often incorporate supporting elements such as flowers, leaves, spirals, and branches, which contribute to enhancing the overall composition. These additions draw attention to the peacock as the central focus of the design.
