In Assam, especially in Kamrup district, the status of women reflects a complex blend of progress and persistent challenges. This study aims to explore the current issues and obstacles hindering women's empowerment in the district. Relying on secondary data from government reports, academic publications, and institutional sources, the research adopts a descriptive and analytical approach. The findings reveal that women in Kamrup continue to face barriers such as low literacy rates, economic dependence, underrepresentation in leadership, health disparities, and social constraints rooted in patriarchy. Despite the presence of welfare schemes and the positive role of Self-Help Groups (SHGs), implementation gaps and cultural resistance limit their effectiveness. The study concludes with recommendations for region-specific policy interventions, improved awareness, better implementation of existing schemes, and greater societal participation in advancing women's rights and empowerment. Empowering women in Kamrup is not just essential for gender justice but also vital for the holistic development of the region.

Introduction

In India, several constitutional provisions and government policies have been implemented to promote gender equality, yet a significant gap remains between policy and practice.

Assam, a northeastern state with a rich cultural heritage, presents a mixed scenario in terms of women's status and development. While Assamese society has historically shown certain progressive traits like participation of women in festivals, traditional crafts, and agriculture deep-rooted patriarchal values continue to limit their social and economic advancement. Among the various districts, Kamrup holds particular importance due to its demographic diversity, urban-rural divide, and growing economic activity. However, the region also reflects stark disparities in women's education, employment, health, and participation in decision-making processes.

Despite the efforts made by government schemes like Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, Self Help Groups (SHGs), and various non-governmental organizations, many women in Kamrup still face social, economic, and political challenges that prevent their full empowerment. Issues such as gender-based violence, poor health care, lack of awareness, and limited access to resources persist, especially in rural and semi-urban areas.

This study aims to explore these issues and challenges in depth, with the goal of identifying practical solutions to bridge the empowerment gap in Kamrup district and contribute to more inclusive and equitable development in Assam.

Significance of the Present Study

The present study is significant because it addresses a crucial and timely issue—women empowerment, particularly in the socio-economic and cultural context of Assam. While national and international focus on gender equality has grown, there still exists a substantial gap between policy and practice in many regions, especially in the Northeastern states like Assam. This study aims to bridge that gap by offering a localized analysis focused on Kamrup district.

- 1. **Understanding Regional Challenges:** Kamrup district includes both rural and urban populations, making it a valuable case for understanding the contrasting realities of women in different socioeconomic settings. The study captures the **specific local issues**—like early marriage, low literacy, unemployment, and restricted mobility—that are often overlooked in broad national reports.
- 2. Guiding Effective Policy-Making: By identifying the actual barriers women face on the ground, the study can inform more effective government policies and welfare programs. For example, it highlights where existing schemes fail to reach or benefit women, and what improvements are needed.
- 3. Improving Implementation of Empowerment Schemes: Assam has several empowerment initiatives such as self-help groups (SHGs), women-centric welfare schemes, and microfinance programs. However, without proper implementation and monitoring, these schemes are not fully effective. This study evaluates these programs and provides feedback for better execution.
- 4. **Encouraging Community Participation:** Empowerment is not just about government support; it also requires **social acceptance and community involvement**. This study encourages dialogue among community leaders, NGOs, and educators, aiming to shift attitudes toward gender roles and women's autonomy.
- 5. Filling Academic and Research Gaps: Most studies on women empowerment in India focus on metro cities or larger states. There is a lack of focused research on Assam, and even fewer studies that look at individual districts like Kamrup. This study adds new knowledge and local insight to the field of gender studies.
- 6. **Promoting Inclusive Development:** No society can progress if half its population is left behind. By addressing issues related to education, health, income, and participation for women, this study supports the broader goal of **inclusive and sustainable development** in Assam

Review of Related Literature

A comprehensive review of literature helps to understand the existing knowledge on women empowerment and identify the gaps that this study seeks to address. Various scholars, government reports, and institutional studies have explored the dynamics of women's empowerment in India and Assam, highlighting both progress and persisting challenges.

- 1. **Amartya Sen (1999)** in his seminal work "Development as Freedom" argues that development must be seen as a process of expanding the real freedoms that people enjoy. He emphasizes that empowering women through education, health, and decision-making leads to overall societal development.
- 2. **Naila Kabeer (2001)** defines empowerment as the process by which those who have been denied the ability to make strategic life choices acquire such an ability. Her framework of resources, agency, and achievements is useful for understanding women's empowerment in local contexts.
- 3. **Desai & Thakkar** (2010), in their book "Women in Indian Society", explore the legal and constitutional provisions for women's rights in India. They point out the gap between legal empowerment and actual access to justice, particularly in rural and semi-urban areas.
- 4. National Family Health Survey (NFHS-5, Assam, 2021) reveals that although literacy and awareness among women in Assam have improved, issues like domestic violence, low employment participation, and limited access to healthcare remain significant concerns, especially in districts like Kamrup.
- 5. Das, P. (2018) conducted a study titled "Status of Women in Assam", which found that despite the active involvement of women in traditional and agricultural activities, they are largely excluded from formal decision-making roles and economic independence.
- 6. **Bora, R.** (2020) in her research on "Empowerment through SHGs in Rural Assam", observed that self-help groups play a crucial role in boosting the confidence, skills, and financial autonomy of rural women, though challenges like lack of training and male dominance persist.
- 7. Government of Assam (2023) in the Statistical Handbook of Assam provided critical demographic and gender-based data showing disparities in female literacy, employment, and access to resources across different districts, with Kamrup presenting a mixed picture.
- 8. UNDP India (2020) in its Gender Equality Strategy emphasized the need for locally-driven, culturally sensitive empowerment models. It highlighted that intersectional issues such as caste, ethnicity, and geographic location significantly affect empowerment outcomes.
- 9. **Assam State Commission for Women Reports** (2022) documented increasing cases of domestic violence, trafficking, and gender discrimination in urban slums and rural belts of Kamrup, showing that legal empowerment alone is insufficient without grassroots social change.
- 10. **Census of India (2011 & 2021 provisional)** data shows that while there has been improvement in the female literacy rate and sex ratio in Assam, disparities persist in female workforce participation and access to land/property ownership, especially in rural Kamrup.

Methodology

This study is descriptive and analytical in nature, aiming to examine the various social, economic, and institutional challenges that hinder women empowerment in Kamrup district of Assam. The research is based on **secondary data sources**, collected and interpreted through a qualitative lens.

1. Research Design

Major Findings

1. Low Educational Attainment in Rural Areas

In Kamrup district, especially in rural regions, many women still lack access to quality education. Social factors like early marriage, household responsibilities, and lack of awareness contribute to low school completion rates. This educational gap limits their ability to participate fully in economic and social spheres.

2. Limited Economic Independence

A large number of women are financially dependent on their husbands or family members. Even those engaged in income-generating activities often lack control over their earnings. Their employment is mostly informal, seasonal, or underpaid, which hinders their overall empowerment.

3. Underrepresentation in Decision-Making

Despite legal provisions for women's participation in Panchayati Raj institutions and other governance platforms, their actual involvement in decision-making remains minimal. Cultural norms and lack of confidence discourage women from taking leadership roles in political and community matters.

4. Ineffective Implementation of Welfare Schemes

Government schemes like Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, PM Matru Vandana Yojana, and SHG-based programs are designed to promote women's welfare. However, ground-level implementation is weak due to lack of awareness, poor monitoring, and administrative delays, especially in rural pockets of Kamrup.

5. Prevalence of Gender-Based Violence

Domestic violence, dowry harassment, and physical abuse are still common. Many women hesitate to report such crimes due to fear of social backlash or lack of legal literacy. This severely impacts their physical and psychological well-being, reducing their confidence and mobility.

6. Health and Nutrition Challenges

7. Women in rural Kamrup face multiple health issues, including maternal health problems, anemia, and malnutrition. Limited access to proper healthcare services, especially in interior areas, contributes to high maternal mortality and poor child health outcomes.

8. Positive Role of SHGs and NGOs

Self-Help Groups (SHGs) have emerged as strong platforms for rural women. They offer access to microloans, skill training, and peer support. Many NGOs have helped women build confidence, manage small businesses, and participate in public affairs. However, such initiatives have yet to reach all women uniformly across the district.

9. Cultural Barriers and Patriarchal Norms

Deep-rooted traditional beliefs restrict women's autonomy in decision-making, freedom of movement, and access to opportunities. These patriarchal practices continue to dominate family and community life, especially in rural areas, suppressing women's voice and choice.

10. Digital Divide and Limited Tech Access

In today's technology-driven world, women in Kamrup face a significant gap in access to mobile phones, internet, and digital literacy. This gap prevents them from utilizing online resources for education, entrepreneurship, or accessing government services.

11. Need for Targeted and Inclusive Policies

One-size-fits-all policies have not addressed local realities effectively. There is a pressing need for **district-specific**, **culturally sensitive**, and **community-driven policies** to promote sustainable empowerment of women in Kamrup. Inclusive planning must consider the intersectionality of gender, caste, class, and **geography**.

Suggestions

1. Promote Women's Education at All Levels

Special attention should be given to reducing dropout rates among girls in rural Kamrup through scholarships, free transportation, and gender-sensitive school environments. Adult literacy programs can also be introduced for uneducated women.

2. Enhance Employment and Skill Development Opportunities

Vocational training centers and digital skill programs should be expanded to equip women with employable skills. Partnerships with NGOs and private enterprises can promote self-employment and entrepreneurship among women, particularly through SHGs.

3. Strengthen Implementation of Welfare Schemes

Regular monitoring and community participation must be ensured for effective implementation of central and state-level schemes. Information campaigns and village-level help desks should be established to raise awareness about available government benefits.

4. Increase Women's Participation in Decision-Making

Local governance bodies should reserve leadership roles for women and offer leadership training. Encouraging women's representation in Panchayats, cooperative societies, and local institutions can lead to more gender-sensitive policies.

5. Combat Gender-Based Violence

Strict enforcement of laws protecting women against domestic violence, dowry, and harassment is essential. Legal aid cells, women's helplines, and shelter homes must be made easily accessible in Kamrup district.

6. Improve Health and Nutrition Facilities

Mobile health clinics, maternal health camps, and free distribution of nutrition supplements should be implemented in underserved rural areas. Health awareness campaigns should focus on reproductive health, hygiene, and immunization.
