Certain plants are used during rituals, festivals, and healing practices because they are believed to possess spiritual significance (Sonowal, 2016). Baitha Worship

Baitha worship occupies an important place in the indigenous religious system of the Sonowal Kacharis. The Baitha serves as a sacred symbol representing divine power and spiritual protection. Community members gather collectively to perform rituals associated with Baitha worship, emphasizing unity, cooperation, and collective welfare (Barooah, 1998).

Over time, Hindu religious traditions significantly influenced Sonowal Kachari religious practices. Shaivism became particularly prominent among the community, and many indigenous beliefs were reinterpreted within a broader Hindu framework (Sonowal, 2016).
