However, the study primarily focuses on identity and does not explore the broader social implications of gender inequality.

2. Nilofer (2018) – *A Feminist Reading of Gently Falls the Bakula*

Nilofer analyzes the novel from a feminist perspective and argues that Murty exposes the subtle forms of oppression that educated women experience within marriage. The study emphasizes that Shrimati's emotional neglect reflects the challenges faced by many middle-class women. The researcher concludes that the protagonist's decision to pursue higher education symbolizes empowerment. Nevertheless, the study offers limited discussion of male characters and their role in sustaining patriarchal structures.

3. Kannake, S. G. (2023) – *Self-Realization and Women's Empowerment*

While he achieves professional recognition, he loses emotional intimacy with his wife. The paper concludes that excessive ambition can weaken family bonds. 8. Singh (2019) – *Women's Resistance in Contemporary Indian Fiction*

Singh includes *Gently Falls the Bakula* among several Indian novels depicting women's resistance. The researcher argues that Shrimati's decision to leave her comfort zone and pursue higher studies represents a subtle form of resistance rather than open rebellion. The study concludes that modern Indian women negotiate oppression through self-development and education. The limitation is that the discussion of Murty's novel remains relatively brief.

Another gap is the lack of a detailed psychological analysis of Shrimati's character. Understanding these psychological dimensions can provide a more comprehensive interpretation of her transformation.

The theme of emotional neglect within marriage also remains insufficiently explored. Many studies rely on general feminist concepts but do not apply specific theoretical frameworks such as liberal feminism, existential feminism, or feminist psychoanalysis. Employing these approaches could generate new interpretations and deeper critical insights.

Moreover, scholars have paid little attention to the symbolism, narrative techniques, and literary devices that Sudha Murty employs to convey themes of identity and empowerment. Most studies focus on

thematic analysis and overlook the artistic elements that contribute to the novel's effectiveness and emotional impact.

Therefore, the present study seeks to address these gaps by examining *Gently Falls the Bakula* through the interconnected themes of women's identity, self-realization, negotiation, education, emotional alienation, and empowerment. By providing a comprehensive analysis of these aspects, the study aims to deepen understanding of Sudha Murty's portrayal of women and the enduring relevance of her work in contemporary feminist literary discourse.
